Re:	Lyme Disease

With the weather getting warmer, pharmacists are encouraged to refresh their knowledge regarding the prevention of tick-borne diseases, including Lyme disease, and the role pharmacists are authorized to play, by reviewing these resources:

• <u>Standards of Practice: Prescribing Drugs, Appendix G - Prescribing for a Diagnosis Supported by a</u> <u>Protocol</u>

Note: that pharmacists may only prescribe for the <u>prevention</u> of Lyme disease when an individual **is asymptomatic**. Individuals who are presenting with an erythema migrans rash or other possible symptoms of Lyme disease should **not** be prescribed the single dose chemoprophylaxis.

Individuals with a rash or other symptoms need to be assessed by a physician or nurse practitioner for treatment.
