Re: Prescribing OAT to Bridge Patients Released from Correctional Facilities

Release from a correctional facility is a particularly vulnerable and dangerous time for patients who are receiving opioid agonist therapy (OAT), with higher rates of both fatal and non-fatal overdose within this group. Frequently, individuals are released unexpectedly and without being issued a prescription for OAT. Physicians from Mental Health and Addictions recognize that pharmacists are important care partners and are asking pharmacists to help support this vulnerable population.

Pharmacists can be assured that they have the authority to prescribe OAT, supported by the <u>Standards of</u> <u>Practice: Prescribing Drugs - Appendix H</u>, for patients who are transitioning from correctional facilities to community to support continuity of care until they can be seen by a community OAT provider (usually less than one week).

Pharmacists prescribing for individuals in these circumstances should:

- Confirm the patient's current dose
- Be reasonably assured of when the patient last received a dose
- Provide the medication as daily witnessed ingestion

The NSCP has confirmed with Health Canada that prescribing in these circumstances is consistent with the <u>Subsection 56(1) class exemption for patients</u>, practitioners and pharmacists prescribing and providing controlled <u>substances in Canada</u>.
